New Career-Oriented Community Concierge Program to Connect Trent Graduates with Local Employers



Trent University graduates will have enhanced access to local employment opportunities, supports and work-integrated learning through the innovative new Community Concierge program, developed in partnership with the City of Kawartha Lakes and Peterborough & the Kawarthas Economic Development (PKED), and supported through \$822,392 in funding through the Government of Ontario's Skills Development Fund.

"Trent University plays a critical role in providing a labour force equipped with the skills employers demand," said Dr. Leo Groarke, president and vice-chancellor of Trent University. "We welcome the Community Concierge program and are working with our partners to create opportunities for our graduates to gain experience and pursue careers in the local community."

Creating a resilient economy with recent graduates

This innovative new program strives to ensure a resilient workforce by supporting the entry of recent graduates into the labour market, and supporting local and rural employers to fill skilled job vacancies.

The 12-month Community Concierge program, led through <u>Careerspace at Trent University</u>, will create new staff positions to support 60 multi-year partnership agreements between Trent University and local employers, and cultivate employment opportunities for 100 recent graduates.

A portion of the Skills Development funding will allow the University to provide training subsidies and support to eligible job seekers during training and upskilling opportunities and the transition to rural employment. Partnership agreements will also address future work integrated learning placements for emerging graduates to better transition them to full-time employment in the region upon graduation.

"This is incredible news for local jobs seekers and employers in Kawartha Lakes and Peterborough County," said Laurie Scott, MPP for Haliburton-Kawartha Lakes-Brock, who made the announcement of the Skills Development funding for the Community Concierge program, as well as funding for two projects at Fleming College. "These three local programs delivered by Fleming College and Trent University will help people upgrade their skills and get connected with good, local jobs that are in-demand now and in the future."

"This coordinated effort between government and education is a great thing for students in Kawartha Lakes," said City of Kawartha Lakes Mayor Andy Letham. "It will help us strengthen our local workforce and help graduates build their careers right in their own community."

The Community Concierge positions will be based out of City of Kawartha Lakes, PKED, and Careerspace at Trent University. The Skills Development Fund is an Employment Ontario program, funded in part by the Government of Canada and the Government of Ontario.

Training program supports development of job search skills, facilitates local career opportunities for students and graduates



The Community Concierge program led through Careerspace at Trent aims to connect recent graduates with local and rural employers throughout the City of Kawartha Lakes and City & County of Peterborough.

Trent University's Community Concierge program – launched this spring – is off to a strong start with 81 recent and emerging graduates having completed the program, and several graduates gainfully employed throughout the region.

"The benefits of work-integrated learning opportunities available through this program are endless," says Ryan Sisson, manager of Community & Workplace Partnerships with Careerspace at Trent University. "When students gain meaningful experience working with employers in the community, they graduate with more employable skills and are more likely to continue their careers here, strengthening the local workforce."

This 12-month career-oriented program, led through <u>Careerspace</u> at Trent, was developed in partnership with the City of Kawartha Lakes and Peterborough & the Kawarthas Economic Development (PKED), and supported through the Government of Ontario's Skills Development Fund, with the aim of connecting recent graduates with local and rural employers throughout the City of Kawartha Lakes and City & County of Peterborough.

Working in collaboration with local partners

"Helping find opportunities for Trent students and graduates to work with and in our local businesses is good for our communities," said Rebecca Mustard, manager of Economic Development at the City of Kawartha Lakes. "We're actively working with community partners to encourage youth to jump in, share their talent, and build their lives in Kawartha Lakes."

"By building stronger connections between students and local employers, we increase the opportunities to retain these young and educated workforce of the future in our communities after graduation and ensure that our local companies have the right

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skills for their operations," says Rhonda Keenan, president & chief executive officer of PKED.

Four-week training program to support job search skills

Utilizing support from the Ontario Skills Development Fund, Trent developed a four-week training program to help emerging and recent graduates with their job search skills.

"I gained more skills and knowledge about navigating the job market and enhancing the likelihood of becoming a successful candidate," says Heidi Parekh '22, a graduate of Trent's Psychology program, affiliated with Lady Eaton College, who participated in the training. "I can't say enough positive things about the program's content, staff, and students."

"I learned about focused career searching, networking, and personal development, which I will take and share with many folks in my life," shares Samm Medeiros '20, a graduate of Trent's Indigenous Environmental Studies & Science who is affiliated with Lady Eaton College.

Multi-year partnership agreements with local employers

In addition to supporting students with career skills, the program supports local and rural employers with filling skilled job vacancies. Trent recently signed partnership agreements with 40 organizations and has over 350 Work-Integrated Learning opportunities. Gauvreau CPA – which recently signed a multi-year partnership with Trent – is one of them.

70 recent graduates connected with employment opportunities, 70 multi-year partnerships with local employers to create work-integrated learning experiences among Community Concierge program highlights



Trent University is celebrating the first year of the Community Concierge program, an innovative, cross-municipality program that connects Trent graduates with career opportunities throughout the City and County of Peterborough and the City of Kawartha Lakes.

Led by Trent, and operated in collaboration with the City of Kawartha Lakes, and Peterborough & the Kawarthas Economic Development (PKED), the program is supported by \$822,392 in funding through the Government of Ontario's Skills Development Fund.

The Community Concierge program was created with the dual purpose of helping recent Trent graduates enter the job market and supporting local and rural employers fill skilled worker vacancies.

"Trent University provides students and graduates with the in-demand skills they need to succeed," says Dr. Leo Groarke, president and vice-chancellor. "We are partnering with Kawartha Lakes, and Peterborough and the Kawarthas Economic Development to create opportunities for our students to gain those skills while ensuring a resilient workforce for local employers."

Led through Careerspace at Trent University, the Community Concierge program establishes and develops a talent pipeline that supports rural economic growth efforts. The program has created 70 multi-year partnership agreements between Trent and local employers to cultivate employment opportunities for more than 100 recent graduates to date.

Nearly 200 guests attended the one-year anniversary celebration on March 24 at Trent, recognizing the contributions from employment partners who have entered into multi-year cooperation agreements with the University to enhance access to local

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employment opportunities for recent graduates. Partners included the March of Dimes, Canadian Mental Health Association, PRI Engineering, and others from across the City of Kawartha Lakes, and the City & County of Peterborough.

These partnership agreements provide future Work-Integrated Learning (WIL) placements for upper-year students to help transition them to local, full-time employment upon graduation.

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
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From the Field to the Workforce: Student-Athlete Excels Through Community Concierge Program

Aidan McLaughlin becomes first student to secure employment through program



Trent University <u>Kinesiology</u> student, Aidan McLaughlin, has become the first to secure employment through the Community Concierge Program, a 12-month initiative designed to enhance Trent graduates' employability.

The program, developed in partnership with the City of Kawartha Lakes and the Peterborough & the Kawarthas Economic Development (PKED), offers training and networking opportunities. McLaughlin credits the program with helping him develop skills and make valuable connections within the community.

A hat-trick of success: on the field, in the classroom, and in the workplace

During his five years at Trent, Aidan has excelled academically as a Kinesiology student, made his mark on the men's Excalibur lacrosse program, and was named the Arthur Cup recipient for the 2022-23 season.

To round out his time at Trent, Aiden met with the Careerspace team to talk about the Community Concierge program and how it could help him land a career after Trent.

"I realized this was an opportunity that would help me make connections in the Peterborough and Kawartha community and develop skills to help make me more employable," he said.

After being accepted to the program, McLaughlin was given open access to a six-module course that included a skill identification tool meant to help students identify their unique skill set. In addition to workshops, course content included guest speakers from the City of Kawartha Lakes, PKED and Trent Alumni, offering students interview tips, insight on the current job market, and networking strategies.

"The variety of workshops related to resume and cover letter building, as well as interview preparation, gave me important practice I didn't know I needed," said Aiden. "Completing these workshops increased the number of responses I received on job

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applications. They also gave me the ability to walk into a job interview with confidence in knowing I knew what to say and how to best present myself. In addition, the opportunity to make connections with local community organizations and members was a valuable and important aspect of the Community Concierge program."
